Report of the Directors for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The directors present their report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2024.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIR

The last year has been a particularly challenging one for Julian House Trading Ltd. We have seen rising costs and an increasingly difficult fundraising and retail environment. The entire bike industry has had a terrible year for bike sales and there have been several high-profile bike business closures.

Despite our enduring USP of selling quality refurbished second-hand bikes, we too have suffered from a slump in sales, and, after a decade of impact, we sadly closed the doors on our Trowbridge bike workshop when the lease came to an end in February. For 10 years it had offered refurbished bikes, new bikes, repairs, and servicing alongside helping hundreds of people get their lives back on track and into employment, through training and work experience opportunities.

We are proud of the amazing contribution the Trowbridge bike workshop made in the community over the years and sincerely thank the staff and volunteers for all their hard work and our customers for their loyal support – it is gratifying that so many have decided to stay with us and bring their custom across to our bike workshop in Bath.

Despite the external challenges, our Bath bike workshop returned its highest profit since the pandemic this year and continues to make a big difference to people's lives in the city. Over the past year we have also maintained the delivery of our excellent training and volunteer programmes, providing confidence and skills development opportunities for people experiencing social exclusion to move forward with their lives. I am proud to share the outcomes of this work and other achievements in this report.

ABOUT JULIAN HOUSE TRADING LIMITED

Julian House Trading Limited is a social enterprise, principally operating bike workshops which trade, with embedded skills development opportunities, work experience placements and employability programmes for people experiencing social exclusion, furthering the wider objectives of Julian House.

Julian House Trading Limited operates on behalf of its parent company, Julian House (a company limited by guarantee and registered charity) as a mixed motive investment and to whom Julian House Trading Limited covenants 100% of its profits.

Julian House Trading Limited has a formal Service Level Agreement with Julian House, outlining their respective responsibilities in relation to the provision of and payment for shared services and ensuring effective separation and governance.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Our Purpose

Operating as a social enterprise, which refurbishes, sells, and maintains bikes, while improving people's lives, through training and work experience opportunities. We put people and planet before profit, and 100% of the profits that we do make, go to the charity Julian House.

REVIEW OF BUSINESS Our performance and achievements

In 2023-24 Julian House Trading Limited's turnover from sales was £291k (compared to £373k in 2022-23). This is in part down to the fact that there is now only one bike workshop that remains open, as the Trowbridge workshop was closed during the year.

The overall result for the year was a loss of £37k (compared to a loss of £25k in 2022-23). While this is not quite the result we hoped for, this includes a £25k fully costed contribution to Julian House for shared central services as well as a £45k deficit incurred by the Trowbridge bike workshop which closed with resultant one-off redundancy and dilapidation costs.

The result for the Bath workshop in isolation was a profit of £8k and a fully costed contribution to Julian House for shared services of £14k.

Last year Julian House Trading Limited's bike workshops continued to help Julian House to raise their profile with new audiences and diversify their income streams, as well as created significant social value through training and skills for homeless and socially excluded people, alongside wider environmental benefits through recycling, reduced waste, and the promotion of sustainable travel.

Detailed below are our activities and achievements for the year, in relation to our strategic aims.

- To provide quality training, employment support, work experience and volunteering opportunities, for people facing barriers to work.
 - We delivered 38 rollouts of our popular Build a Bike course for people experiencing social exclusion.
 - We supported 131 people experiencing social exclusion to access employment support, Build-a-Bike courses and work experience placements at our bike workshops.
 - We provided tailored one-to-one support to 74 people experiencing social exclusion to help them reach their personal and educational goals.
 - We supported 33 people experiencing social exclusion to gain AQA accreditations in Building a Bike, Maintaining a Bike, and Health and Safety at Work.
 - We supported 2 people experiencing social exclusion into paid work.

 - We continued to offer Julian House employees a 20% discount at our bike workshops.
 - We achieved 100% client satisfaction with all clients rating their experience on the Build a Bike course and the
 instruction and resources provided in the Bike Workshop as either good or excellent.
 - We maintained and improved our Google review ratings (4.8/5 stars).

 - We continued to ensure that 100% of bike workshop staff are qualified to at least Cytech level two.
 - We delivered **10** cycle maintenance courses, including one women-only course.
 - We sold 1090 refurbished second-hand bikes to customers, resulting in c.349 tonnes of carbon saved.

- We sold 6 bikes through the Cycle to Work scheme, Green Commute Initiative.
- We carried out **7,191** bike services and repairs.
- We sold £16k half-day bike hires through our fleet of e-bikes.
- We produced regular newsletters for our 1,200+ subscribers.
- We took in over **1,000** donated bikes avoiding them going to landfill.
- We carried out 9 Dr Bike sessions for Bath Spa, University of Bath and Buro Happold.
- We sent around 100 second-hand bikes to Africa via our friends at Prodigal Bikes.
- We engaged 1,361 Instagram followers and 1,046 Facebook followers.
- We recycled 1250KG of rubber instead of sending it to landfill and received a certificate from Velorim to mark the
 achievement.

 - We took the decision to close our Trowbridge bike workshop to increase profits for the charity next year.
 - We generated a profit of £7,636 from our Bath bike workshop.
 - We contributed £24,906 to Julian House for shared central services.
 - We undertook a management review and appointed a new General Manager and new Head of Retail to drive commerciality.
 - We received £9,687 in grants from Trusts and Foundations.
 - We supported Julian House with their inaugural bike fundraising event, the Bath Beast.
 - We contributed client case studies and content for the Charity's fundraising appeals.
 - We calculated that our bike workshops generated £278,007 in social value measured using the HACT social value bank.
 - We provided to Julian House a more attractive bid proposition to local authorities as a result of the social value generated by the workshops.

Report of the Independent Auditors to the Members of Julian House Trading Limited

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Julian House Trading Limited (the 'company') for the year ended 31 March 2024 which comprise the Income Statement, Balance Sheet and Notes to the Financial Statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

Responsibilities of directors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities set out on page four, the directors are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the directors determine necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue a Report of the Auditors that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

Based on our understanding of the Company, we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to health and safety, employment law and company legislation, and we considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material effect on the financial statements of the Company. We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements such as the Companies Act 2006 and taxation legislation. We evaluated management's incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the risk of override of controls), and determined that the principal risks were related to posting inappropriate journal entries to increase revenue or reduce expenditure, and management bias in accounting estimates and judgemental areas of the financial statements. Audit procedures performed by the audit engagement team included:

- Discussions with management, including consideration of known or suspected instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations and fraud:
- Understanding of management's internal controls designed to prevent and detect irregularities, and fraud;
- Reviewing the Company's legal costs to check for non-compliance with laws and regulations and fraud;
- Reviewing Board of Directors minutes;
- Designing audit procedures to incorporate unpredictability around the nature, timing or extent of our testing of expenses;
- Testing any transactions entered into outside of the normal course of the Company's business;

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above and the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it. Also, the risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusion.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Julian House Trading Limited is a private company, limited by shares, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information page.

The presentation currency of the financial statements is the Pound Sterling (£).

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" including the provisions of Section 1A "Small Entities" and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Related party exemption

The company has taken advantage of exemption, under the terms of Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', not to disclose related party transactions with it's parent company on the basis that it is a wholly owned subsidiary within the group.

Turnover

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discounts and value added taxes. Turnover includes revenue earned from the sale of goods and from the rendering of services. Turnover from the sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have transferred to the buyer. Turnover from the rendering of services is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract. The stage of completion of a contract is measured by comparing the costs incurred for work performed to date to the total estimated contract costs.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulative depreciation and any accumulative impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Short-term leasehold property over 10 years Fixtures and fittings over 5 years Motor vehicles over 5 years

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is determined using the first in first out method. The carrying amount of stock sold is recognised as an expense in the period in which the related revenue is recognised. The company does not value second hand goods where it is impractical to do so.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the invoice price), less any impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts. Loans and other financial assets are initially recognised at transaction price including any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the invoice price). Loans and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at transaction price net of any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method.

Taxation

Taxation for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Income Statement, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current or deferred taxation assets and liabilities are not discounted.

Current tax is recognised at the amount of tax payable using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.

Timing differences arise from the inclusion of income and expenses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in financial statements. Deferred tax is measured using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the year end and that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference.

Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their estimated useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of these obligations is charged to profit or loss over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the company's pension scheme are charged to profit or loss in the period to which they relate.

Going concern

The directors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e., whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. At the year end date, although the company had net liabilities, having reviewed the expected future performance of the company and obtained confirmation of the ongoing support of the parent charity, the directors are satisfied that the company continues to be a going concern and have prepared the accounts on this basis. The directors will continue to monitor and review the viability of Julian House Trading Limited, and taking relevant action, as needed, to benefit the charity.
